t the outset, let me wish you all a very happy new year. The new year has begun on a rather difficult and challenging note, with the third wave of the covid pandemic clearly upon us. This marks nearly two years of immense destabilization, uncertainties and tremendous pressure on individuals, societies and economies world over.

In all this the illicit operators are riding high on vulnerabilities and have been making use of these rather unfortunate developments to further their vicious and immoral agenda by pushing smuggled, counterfeit, and spurious goods into the markets. Their activities are causing immense damage to the already embattled genuine manufacturers and gravely impacting the national exchequer. Several reports indicate that over the last two years the ongoing pandemic has caused an increase in illicit trade activities across a multitude of industries including pharmaceuticals, consumer goods, tobacco, alcoholic drinks, PPE products, sanitizing products, luxury goods, beauty, personal care products and so on and so forth.

As smugglers and counterfeiters continue to find ways to multiply their profits, penetrate new distribution channels and innovate across production and supply chains, necessary and immediate steps are required to stem their unholy march. I am happy to share with you that FICCI CASCADE, over the last few months has intensified and modified its national awareness campaign against smuggling and counterfeiting to effectively address this problem which continues to evolve in a disturbing manner.

The Police department being the primary law enforcement agency in our country, plays a significant role in ensuring the protection of legitimate businesses from illicit players. CASCADE has been intensively engaging with police officers across the states in order to sensitize them on their role in preventing crimes related to smuggling and counterfeiting and assigning adequate priority to such cases. In this backdrop, we organized capacity building programmes for police officers of Maharashtra, Jammu and Kashmir, West Bengal and Himachal Pradesh during last few months, where around 500 officers were sensitized through these workshops. In addition to this, CASCADE recently initiated a similar training programme for state excise officers and engaged with the State Excise Department of Rajasthan. Going forward, FICCI CASCADE plans to organize similar engagements with several other states.

Our 'In Conversation Series' – a platform to share insights and deepen understanding on the various facets of illicit trade with subject matter experts saw an insightful discussion with Lt Gen Pradeep Chandran Nair, AVSM, YSM, DG, Assam Rifles. Lt Gen Nair stated that their force is committed to working in synergy with all Central and State agencies to combat illegal trade and smuggling. In another conversation, Mr. Maurice Emiola Adéfalou, Technical Officer, IPR, and Health and Safety Programme Manager in Compliance, WCO discussed in detail on how collaboration, stringent actions and dialogue with private players are key to curb illicit activities.

Recently, Capt. Dibya Shankar Mishra, Minister for Industries, MSME, Energy and Home, Govt. of Odisha addressed our state webinar for Odisha on "Combating Counterfeiting and Smuggling during the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond". Hon'ble minister highlighted how counterfeit and smuggled goods have penetrated deep into our society and are impacting the socio-economic prosperity of the country, and this needs to be addressed on priority.

Youth is a key stakeholder in our fight against this socio-economic threat and in order to further strengthen our association with them, we organised the 2nd edition of the online story telling competition - My COVID Story, titled, 'Share Your Story- Speak Up and Make a Difference'. Assam Rifles seized illegal goods worth ₹1,600cr since '20

Guwahati: The Assam Rifles has seized over Rs 1,600 crore worth of illegally traded goods in the northeast region from Myanmar since 2020, the chief of the paramilitary force said.

Such unlawful trade is alarming and detrimental to national development and India's Act East Policy, Assam Rifles director general Lt Gen Pradeep Chandran Nair said at an event organised by industry chamber FICCI. He said the force is committed to work with all central and state agencies to combat illegal trade and smuggling in the region. "The Assam Rifles in the year 2020

"The Assam Rifles in the year 2020 seized Rs 857 crore of illegally traded goods and around Rs 746 crore in 2021," Nair said. "The force has been at the helm of af-

"The force has been at the helm of affairs to counter illegal trade along the 1,643km porous and unfenced India-Myanmar border. The whole region is of great importance from an economic and strategic point of view," he said.

Former special commissioner of Delhi police, Deep Chand, said illicit trade across the borders is impacting the social fabric of nations, and India in particular, is a victim of large-scale smuggling.

The proceeds from the illegal trade are increasingly becoming the main source of terror funding, said Anil Rajput, chairman of FICCI's committee against smuggling and counterfeiting activities destroying


Webinar on Combating Counterfeiting and Smuggling during the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond Be Vocal for Local and Prevent Illicit Trade

On one hand, while open borders facilitate travel and trade, they also make border control more challenging due to the emerging new forms of cross border crimes. Hence, it becomes vital that officers at the borders are prepared to identify possible suspects and their victims in such ill-intentioned crimes. To understand and deliberate on issues of cross-border smuggling in India, preparedness of the government and initiatives taken by Assam Rifles to combat this menace, Lt Gen Pradeep Chandran Nair, AVSM, YSM, DG, Assam Rifles joined for an 'In Conversation Series' programme of FICCI's Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Activities Destroying the Economy (CASCADE) on 17th

The Force is committed to working in synergy with all Central and State agencies to combat illegal trade and smuggling towards its rightful end.

Mr. Deep Chand, Former Special Commissioner of Police, New Delhi, and Advisor, FICCI CASCADE while in conversation with Lt Gen P C Nair said "Illicit trade across the borders is impacting the social fabric of nations; India in particular is a victim of large-scale smuggling. This web of illicit trade has entangled not only the legal industry and governments, but also the consumers who are exposed to grave risks to life and security".

n terms of counterfeiting and smuggling, illicit trade makes up a vast 'global businesses', representing a multibillion-dollar illegal industry that creates a significant drain on the world economy. The practice of illicit trade not only negatively impacts the economy of the nations but also poses a serious threat to health conditions of the individuals, especially during the time of COVID-19 pandemic.

FICCI's Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting





Activities Destroying the Economy organised an 'In Conversation with Mr. Maurice Emiola Adéfalou, Technical Officer, IPR, and Health and Safety Programme Manager in Compliance, WCO' on 11th October 2021. The session was organised to discuss the menace of cross-border trafficking of products and to find ways and means to address the growing hazards of smuggling and counterfeiting across the nations.

Addressing the **'In Conversation Series', Mr Adéfalou** while speaking on WCO's Operation STOP, said that the main objective of the operation was to protect societies from the menace of illicit and spurious medicines, vaccines and medical products during the COVID pandemic. He further stated that the learnings from operation STOP was to work together and be aware and prepared about the market." "Collaboration, stringent actions against perpetrators and dialogue with private players are key to curb any kind of illicit activities", stressed Mr. Adefalou.

Mr. Anil Rajput, Chairman, FICCI CASCADE while addressing the session said, "Operation STOP which was WCO's immediate response against illicit trafficking of medicines, vaccines and medical supplies linked to COVID-19 pandemic, played a determinant role in the fight against the illicit trade during this health crisis." He said that the CBIC in India has been a longstanding and valued member of the World Customs Organization. "It has a strong cooperation with the WCO in a number of enforcement related areas. During the covid period the Indian Customs, Directorate of Revenue Intelligence and other enforcement authorities have seized smuggled, spurious, and counterfeit vaccines sanitizers, masks, PPE Kits, disinfectants, toiletries and cosmetics, electronic goods, cigarettes, spices, alcohol and several other items across various states and in large numbers," Mr. Rajput added.

Mr. Najib Shah, Former Chairman, CBIC and Think Tank Member, FICCI CASCADE said, "The need for cooperation between Customs Administrations, enforcement agencies within the country and industry are essential to thwart the growing menace of counterfeit trade." Issues of the crossborder smuggling, initiatives taken by WCO to arrest this problem and the need for effective collaborations in mitigating this challenge were also discussed.

Capacity Building Programme for State Excise Officials on Prevention of Counterfeiting and Smuggling

he practice of illicit trade involving counterfeiting and smuggling not only inflict monetary losses on individuals but also damages the national economy, have security implications, and jeopardize consumer's health. FICCI's Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Activities Destroying the Economy (CASCADE) organised a capacity building programme on Prevention of Counterfeiting and Smuggling for the excise officers of Rajasthan on 15th September 2021. The programme was organised to sensitize the officers on the socio-economic Excise Department, Government of Rajasthan in his keynote address said, "In order to prevent illicit trade of liquor the state of Rajasthan has taken various measures such as introducing excise preventive force to monitor the mobility and smuggling of alcoholic beverages between states; implementing track and trace system where each legal bottle or carton is traced from the place of production till the place of consumption; introduction of Navjeevan Scheme for providing resources of livelihood to people engaged in manufacturing, storing and sale of illicit liquor, etc.".



impact of illicit and spurious alcohol, facilitate better engagement and cooperation of industry members and excise officers to prevent this menace.

Mr. P C Jha, Advisor FICCI CASCADE and Former Chairman, Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs gave an overview on Socio-Economic Impact of Counterfeiting & Smuggling. While highlighting this issue, Mr. Jha said that for every manufactured product there exists a counterfeit in the market and to tackle this problem effective coordination and cooperation among different stakeholders such as government, enforcement agencies, industry, consumers, media is the need of the hour.

Dr. Joga Ram, IAS, Excise Commissioner, Rajasthan State

The uncertain situation of global crisis in the year 2020 made illicit trade as a matter of serious concern. While the government was committed towards fighting the health crisis, the perpetrators of the illicit trade used this as an opportunity to expand and intensify their operations. Since the onset of the pandemic enforcement agencies have raided and seized smuggled, spurious and counterfeited medicines, healthcare products, cosmetics, electronic goods, alcohols, packaged goods and several other items.


Mr. Deep Chand, IPS (Retd), Former Special Commissioner of Police, New Delhi and Advisor, FICCI CASCADE while addressing the session praised the alert excise authorities of Rajasthan who have raided counterfeit liquor production units and seized huge volumes of spurious liquor during these

unprecedented times. "However, with increased number of seizures being reported every day, it is highly possible that the total seizure may just be the tip of the iceberg of a much larger network. Hence, it is extremely important that our enforcement agencies keep up their already impressive work," he further added.

Capacity building programme organized by FICCI CASCADE is

an ongoing exercise that plays an instrumental role in motivating and enabling the law enforcement agencies to understand the gravity of the problem and take requisite actions against the perpetrators.

Capacity Building Programme for Police Officers on Prevention of Counterfeiting and Smuggling

3rd August 2021 | Focus State- West Bengal

ICCI's Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Activities Destroying the Economy (CASCADE) organized a Capacity Building Programme on Prevention of Counterfeiting and Smuggling for the officers of West Bengal Police on 3rd August 2021. Chief Guest at the programme, Dr. Debasish Roy, IPS ADG, Training, West Bengal Police, said "Despite various anticounterfeiting strategies, like raids, use of multiple packaging technologies, consumer education and consultations with government agencies the menace of smuggling and counterfeiting is on the rise." He further added that frequent seizures of contraband items such as cigarettes, alcohol, drugs and pharmaceuticals along with illegal imports of clothing were causing economic crisis leading to unemployment and poverty.

Mr. Deep Chand, Advisor FICCI CASCADE and Former Special Commissioner of Delhi Police, presented an overview of the socio-economic threat of smuggling and counterfeiting. In his presentation he highlighted how the grey market economy was fueling illegitimate industry, leading to increased criminalization of the society in the form of organized crime including terrorism. He said, "This capacity building programme is aimed to sensitize police officers to emphasize on the importance of continued awareness and seriousness of the impact of counterfeit and smuggled goods.'



Although there are adequate laws available, their enforcement makes the role of police officers even more important in the fight against counterfeiters and smugglers." Complimenting the officials of the police department, he further said that during the Covid19 pandemic, our officers had been playing a crucial part in contributing to the effort to control the menace, promoting safer communities, and fighting criminals who were taking advantage of the outbreak.

Some of the key recommendations that emerged during the programme included capacity building in terms of skill, infrastructure and technology among the law enforcement agencies in improving the detection and investigation of crimes; need for additional manpower with the desired aptitude to be provided in special cells, District Investigation Units, Economic Offences Wing who could focus exclusively on the investigation of such cases; severe extant bail provisions; non-bailable offence for repeat offenders; rigorous imprisonment and stringent monetary penalty, among others.

All speakers unanimously agreed that the issue of illicit trade needs to be addressed as a high priority issue for the government. An orchestrated strategy including communication, coordination and close cooperation among various government agencies, law enforcement officials and

private sector to combat this menace is imperative. The programme saw participation of several officers of West Bengal Police from Bankura, Islampur, Jagipur, Uttar Dinajpur, Murshidabad, Mednipur, Jhargam, Siliguri and Birbhum.

FICCI CASCADE has been successful in stirring an active debate on the topic nationally through various awareness programmes. Among other activities, FICCI CASCADE has been organizing capacity building programs for police officers in various states, focusing on economic offences such as counterfeiting and smuggling, equipping the officers to understand the laws and take requisite action against counterfeiters and smugglers. In pursuance of its mandate, FICCI-CASCADE will continue to hold similar programmes across the country in briefing enforcement agencies on procedural and enforcement issues while tackling illicit trading activities.

Capacity Building Programme for Police Officers on Prevention of Counterfeiting and Smuggling

20th August 2021 | Focus State: Jammu and Kashmir

ICCI CASCADE (Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Activities Destroying the Economy) organized a capacity building programme on Prevention of Counterfeiting and Smuggling for the police officers of Jammu and Kashmir on 20th August 2021. Dr S. D. Singh IPS, ADGP, Director, Sher-I-Kashmir Police Academy, Udhampur was the chief guest at the programme. During his keynote address he said, "Counterfeiting and smuggling not only poses serious threat to the health and safety of the consumers but also endangers the national security. This problem holds special concern for us as the UT of Jammu and Kashmir, which is particularly vulnerable to the ill effects of illicit trade, due to hostile the neighbouring nations".

Highlighting the issue of smuggled and counterfeit goods in the region, Dr Singh said, that the officers of the Jammu and Kashmir police were committed to curb this menace and have a strong hold on the situation. He further added that in recent times they have seized large quantity of fake sanitizers along with huge consignments of illicit cigarettes, alcohol and FMCG products. During the session, Mr. Deep Chand, Advisor FICCI CASCADE and Former Special Commissioner of Police, New Delhi presented an overview on the socio-economic threat of counterfeiting and smuggling. He explained how the police department, being the primary law enforcement agency in the country, play a significant role in ensuring the protection of legitimate businesses from counterfeiters and smugglers. He shared various international and national case studies, police actions against counterfeiters and smugglers, the set of relevant laws, methods adopted by illicit traders, among others, to sensitize the officers of the magnitude of the menace and highlight their role in the fight against counterfeiters and smugglers.

Some of the key recommendations at the programme included, need for an Inter-ministerial set up for cooperation and coordination to effectively combat smuggling and counterfeiting; expeditious investigation of cases; ensuring prosecution in a time-bound manner; training and capacity building of police officers to investigate such cases; rigorous



imprisonment and stringent monetary penalty among others. One of FICCI CASCADE's mandate is capacity building of law enforcement agencies including Police, Customs and Paramilitary Forces. It has worked extensively and intensively in this area organizing training programmes and seminars along with continuous interactions with the law enforcement authorities to emphasize on the importance of continued awareness and seriousness of the impact of counterfeit and smuggled goods. The capacity building programme in the Sher-I-Kashmir Police Academy, Udhampur sensitized over 100 officers on the growing dimensions of illicit trade activities through smuggling and counterfeiting detrimental for economy, public health, genuine producers as well as customers.

Mr. Rajesh Sharma, Co-chair, FICCI Jammu & Kashmir State Council and CEO, Skipper Overseas Ltd, in his concluding address, said that India's economy and public safety continued to suffer from the ill effects of widespread smuggling and counterfeiting, Therefore, arresting this menace is vital. He urged the support of all the stakeholders, especially the police force in thwarting this threat to the nation.

ICCI CASCADE (Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Activities Destroying the Economy) organized a capacity building programme on Prevention of Counterfeiting and Smuggling for the police officers of Himachal Pradesh on 30th November 2021. **Mr. Bimal Gupta, DIG cum Principal, Himachal Pradesh Police Training College** was the chief guest at the

During his keynote address he said, "It has become imperative that India as a part of the global economy calls for stern and resolute counterstrike force against the ill-intentioned activities such as smuggling and counterfeiting." Criminals have started to exploit consumers under the shield of COVID-19 pandemic through counterfeit medical products, frauds and cybercrimes, he added.

During the session, Mr. Deep Chand, Advisor, FICCI CASCADE and Former Special Commissioner of Delhi Police said that the grey market economy is fuelling illegitimate industry, leading to increased criminalization of the society in the form of organized crimes including terrorism. This capacity building program is aimed to sensitize the police officers to emphasize on the importance of continued awareness and seriousness of the impact of counterfeit and smuggled products.

Mr. P C Jha, Advisor, FICCI CASCADE and Former Chairman, Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs in his welcome address said that India is a victim of large-scale smuggling, impacting not only the legal industry and economy, but also exposing consumers to the grave risks to life and security. Complimenting the police officers of Himachal Pradesh, he further stated that despite the constant struggle, the enforcement officials have been determined to push back the smugglers, counterfeiters, tax evaders and traffickers.

Some of the key recommendations that emerged at the program included the need for capacity building in terms of

skills, infrastructure and technology amongst the law enforcement agencies in improving the detection and investigation of crimes; need for additional manpower, a dedicated Economic Offences Wing, non-bailable offence measures for repeat offenders, including rigorous imprisonment and stringent monetary penalty, among others.

The capacity building program saw participation of several officers of Himachal Pradesh Police across various districts. These programs organized by FICCI CASCADE are aimed to sensitize the police officers on the importance of continued awareness and the seriousness of the impact of counterfeit and smuggled goods on the Indian economy.



Inspiring ways in which India is beating back counterfeiters and smugglers

Expert Insight article by Anil Rajput Chairman, FICCI CASCADE



As the Chairman of India's anti-counterfeiting committee <u>FICCI CASCADE</u>, Mr Anil Rajput has helped significantly increase national awareness surrounding the hazards of counterfeiting and smuggling. In this article, he shares some of the bold and unique measures that have seen success in India.

Ever since India transitioned from a closed to an open economy in the 1990s, the demand for big-name brands has grown. Unfortunately, this popularity of brands has also created a growing market for counterfeits and pass-offs in the country.

Today, India faces a particularly tough challenge when it comes to the prevention of counterfeits entering the country. There are many forest borders which are hard to police, some of which offer direct connections to countries that produce large numbers of counterfeit products. And many of those products look so similar to the originals that consumers cannot tell the difference.

As a result, a system is needed that provides an organized way to communicate and engage with consumers and policy makers alike, sensitizing them to the dangers that counterfeits pose to public health and safety, while also exposing the economic damage that illicit products can cause society as a whole.

India's answer to counterfeiting and smuggling

With these issues in mind, in 2011 I collaborated with the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) to establish the Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Activities Destroying the Economy (CASCADE), or FICCI CASCADE for short. Working with FICCI proved to be a

decisive success factor, as legitimate businesses are highly impacted by the spread of illicit goods and it was very much in their own interest to join forces in fighting their proliferation.

To achieve our goals, we engage with various industry players, consumers, the media, legal experts, consumer organizations as well as enforcement agencies, just to name a few. Our vision is to win over as many people as possible and to make them our ambassadors, or *My vision going forward is to make the lives of counterfeiters and smugglers as difficult as possible.*

"Cascaders" as we call them. Cascaders carry the message that buying legal products is much more beneficial, because many illicit products are hazardous to people's health and safety, as well as the economy.

As an organization, FICCI CASCADE continues to grow, learn and get stronger every year.

Outreach measures in India

One of our key findings is that people will generally not pay much attention when you tell them that counterfeiting is a serious problem. It is vital to deliver arguments, motivation and also share some data with them.

Besides sharing data and international experience with businesses, India's judiciary sector and police departments, we also put a lot of focus on informing consumers themselves. One of our many public outreach measures is our video program. We have created many short films featuring everyday people, celebrities as well as government officials who all highlight the dangers of counterfeits. For the most part, they are not in English, but you can get an idea of what we are doing from our video archive.

We have also generated a series of publications in order to raise awareness and help people understand the magnitude of the problem. Furthermore, we are cooperating with the Ministry of Higher Education to get our messaging into textbooks. Some of the more creative initiatives we have done were an art competition and an essay competition, in which mostly children participated and produced extraordinary works.

This kind of outreach is generally funded by the companies and industry organizations that support us, but many of our measures are jointly funded by the media channels, as well. Obviously, initiatives like the writing or art competitions are less expensive than a television commercial, for example, but in my opinion they create more of an emotional connection that leaves a lasting impression. So I consider all of our measure equally important and effective in their own way.

Counterfeiting in India during COVID-19

As one might suspect, illicit operators are always looking for new opportunities, and the pandemic provided them with many. For instance, when there was a shortage of products such as drugs, oximeters and personal protective equipment, counterfeiters took advantage of the situation and began creating and selling dangerous alternatives, from ineffective sanitizers to spurious medicines.

Fortunately, India's enforcement agencies were equally alert during this period, and they did a marvelous job in catching many of the perpetrators. At FICCI CASCADE we did our part to sensitize consumers that when they buy anything in such a state of crisis, they have to be extra careful. We got the message out that unscrupulous people were trying to sell dangerous counterfeits that can really harm consumer health and safety. So, considering the enormity of the problem at the time, India's prevention and enforcement mechanisms worked quite well.

Bringing an underground menace out into the open

In a country as large as India, it is very difficult to get an overview of the volume of illicit trade, because there are so many products and every sector of the economy is affected differently. Our experts are constantly observing the market and we publish regular reports, revealing how, for instance, sectors such as FMCG, computer hardware, auto parts, cigarettes or the motion picture industry are impacted.

When we share this data with consumers and policy makers, they truly come to understand how big of a menace we are faced with, because the depth of this issue is normally not visible. Without data, nobody realizes the depth of economic loss that the state experiences. And when we bring up the health hazards of counterfeit products – such as medicines that can kill, rather than cure you – people quickly wake up and listen.

Over the years, our awareness-raising efforts have won FICCI CASCADE increased support and funding, which enables us to make much more noise and continually increase the pressure on illicit trade. Compared to the year 2011, when we first began, we feel that there is now a much greater understanding and appreciation of the menace of illicit goods at all levels of society. However, no matter what we do, it is never enough given the enormity of the task. The fight against counterfeiting requires a sustained effort. Besides our work for consumers, I am personally engaging with government leadership to shape policy in a way that makes the lives of counterfeiters and smugglers as difficult as possible. For instance, by encouraging the allocation of funding to educate law enforcement as well as equip them with technologically sophisticated means to subvert the inflow of illicit goods.

Differentiating between counterfeits, pass-offs and smuggled goods

Many people have trouble understanding the differences between counterfeits, pass-offs and smuggled goods. More important than their differences though is to understand that they all pose safety risks. Here are the differences, just to clarify:

- Counterfeits can be defined as illicit products that try to copy a brand as much as possible, in order to trick people.
- Pass-offs are products that make a small change to the original (e.g. changing a letter in the brand name) in a thinly veiled attempt to avoid some legal troubles, yet still trick the consumer.
- Smuggled goods are goods which actually come from an authentic source, but instead of passing through customs legally, they are smuggled across the border to avoid taxes, regulations and safety requirements.


